Heating Oil Prices in a Holding Pattern Following Labor Day

Augusta--- The Governor’s Office of Energy Independence and Security (OEIS) conducted its weekly oil survey and found that the current statewide average cash price for No. 2 heating oil to be at **\$2.56 per gallon**, down one cent from last week.

“Labor Day marked the end of the summer driving season and gasoline demand typically drops before heating oil use increases,” said OEIS Director John Kerry. “We’ve seen oil prices hold steady at around \$75 for most of the past year while the economy has slowly recovered. During this oil price holding pattern, it’s important for homeowners and businesses to evaluate their upcoming heating needs and explore energy improvements that may help counter a potential rise in prices.”

It is important to note that the price for heating oil is a statewide average and that prices in a given geographic region of the state may be considerably higher or lower than the statewide average. Within the OEIS sample, the lowest actual heating oil price of \$2.30 per gallon was found in the Southwest and Western regions. The highest price of \$2.76 per gallon was found in the Eastern and Northern regions. The statewide kerosene price average is \$2.93 per gallon at this time. The statewide average for propane based on a use of 600 gallons a year is \$2.60 per gallon. The table above provides current Maine cash prices in dollars rounded to the nearest penny. At the time of this release the price of WTI crude oil, a major driver of refined product prices, including heating oil was \$73.42.
