## ELIGIBILITY

### Low Income

- Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP), or
- Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) for food assistance, or
- Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) for cash assistance, or
- MaineCare for medical insurance coverage

### Moderate Income

- Adjusted Gross Income (AGI) up to \$70,000 for individual filers and \$100,000 for joint filers

## OTHER REQUIREMENTS

- EV purchaser must buy an off-peak charger before vehicle purchase.
- Vehicle must be purchased from a Participating Dealer or directly from a manufacturer.
- Off-peak charger must be installed at Maine residence and connected to Wi-Fi within 90 days of vehicle purchase.

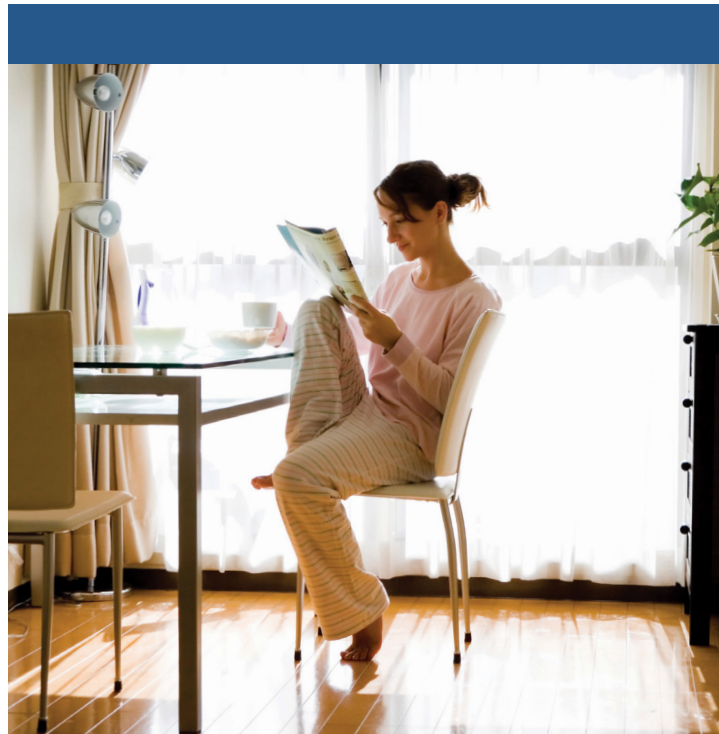

## HEAT PUMPS

Over 200,000 heat pumps have been installed in Maine and they are now more common than oil heat in new homes. They are the most popular heating system across all of Efficiency Maine's rebates because they offer highly efficient heating, air conditioning, and dehumidification.

### REBATES

- Up to a lifetime limit of \$9,000 in heat pump rebates per housing unit\* for low income
- Up to a lifetime limit of \$6,000 in heat pump rebates per housing unit\* for moderate income

### ELIGIBILITY

#### *Low Income*

- Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP), or
- Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) for food assistance, or
- Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) for cash assistance, or
- MaineCare for medical insurance coverage

#### *Moderate Income*

- Adjusted Gross Income (AGI) up to \$70,000 for individual filers and \$100,000 for joint filers

### OTHER REQUIREMENTS

- Single-family house, two-unit duplex, condominium, or mixed-use building with one or two housing units and no commercial electrical meter(s)

\* A housing unit is defined as having a dedicated kitchen, sleeping area, and bathroom.

## MOBILE HOME INITIATIVE

Ducted heat pump systems are installed into the HVAC closet of mobile homes, also referred to as manufactured homes, and use the existing ductwork to reduce heating costs and provide cooling in the summer.

### REBATE

- \$12,900 for a pre-approved, ducted heat pump system

### ELIGIBILITY

#### *Homeowner*

- Homeowner or homeowner's household member must be a verified recipient of MaineCare or HEAP or SNAP or TANF, or household income must be 80% or less of the median income for the county in which the home is located
- Homeowner must agree to the removal of existing heating system (included in the project cost)
- Homeowner must have an active email address

#### *Building*

- Single-wide mobile home only
- Homeowner's principal, year-round residence
- Home must be heated entirely by kerosene or propane
- Home must be located in one of [the designated towns](#) listed in the table on Efficiency Maine's website
- Home must not have an existing heat pump
- If the home is not suitable due to excess heat loss, underbelly damage, or compromised ductwork, the customer has the option to take advantage of [insulation rebates up to \\$8,000](#)
- Furnace closet must be 18 inches or wider to fit heat pump system

## INSULATION

Adding insulation and reducing the amount of air that leaks in and out of your home can be a cost-effective way to reduce heating costs and improve comfort.

### REBATES

- 80% of project cost up to maximum rebate of \$8,000 for low income
- 60% of project cost up to maximum rebate of \$6,000 for moderate income

- Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) for food assistance, or
- Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) for cash assistance, or
